# **Talking Points**

#### **R-H License Plates Support Scholarship Fund**

Indiana-based parents can showcase their pride in Rose-Hulman and support student scholarships by purchasing specialized Rose-Hulman license plates from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles. License plates are available for cars and motorcycles.

No authorization form is required, just ask for the special Rose-Hulman license plate from the local BMV office.

Rose-Hulman's scholarship fund receives a \$25 tax deductible contribution from each license purchase. Funds raised by the Rose-Hulman Collegiate License Plate program typically provide \$40,000 annually in scholarships to Rose-Hulman students.

# **R-H Tops PayScale List** For Graduates' Salaries

A student's college choice is important in possibly determining how much money a graduate will make at 23 years old or by the time the alumnus turns 42 years old. And, not surprising, Rose-Hulman graduates do very well after leaving the college.

Payscale.com examined graduates of 600 U.S. colleges and universities for their median starting and mid-career salaries.

Rose-Hulman came out No. 1 on the median starting salary (\$61,100) and No. 2 on the median mid-career salary (\$98,000) among 17 Indiana institutions. (Notre Dame was first at \$121,000).

Trailing Rose-Hulman on the median starting salary list were Notre Dame, \$55,300; Purdue, \$51,000; Indiana, \$46,000; Evansville, \$43,500; Butler, \$42,900; DePauw, \$41,900; Indiana Tech, \$41,800; and Marian, \$41,800.

On the median mid-career salary list, Purdue was third at \$90,700, followed by Butler, \$83,100; Indiana, \$82,600; Evansville, \$77,000; DePauw, \$75,900; and Taylor, \$70,400.

Al Lee, director of quantitative analysis at PayScale, says the college salary report is a way for parents and students to figure out if they're choosing the right school for their major, location and salary potential.

#### **Prospects Applying in Record Numbers**

In spite of these challenging economic times, Rose-Hulman is still a popular choice for high-achieving high school seniors. The college set a record with over 3,600 applications of admissions being received for the 2010-11 freshman class.

This marks the second straight year that Rose-Hulman has achieved an application record. Overall, applications have increased 20 percent over the past two years, according to James Goecker, vice president of enrollment management.

Rose-Hulman is also gaining an international reputation in undergraduate engineering, science and math education. The 2009-10 freshman class had a record number of international students and the admissions office has experienced a 44 percent increase in international student applications this year. Students from 44 countries have applied to be in the 2010-11 freshman class.

#### **Hotline Being Duplicated in California**

Rose-Hulman's groundbreaking Homework Hotline has become a role model for helping middle- and high-school students learn math and science principles. Now, aspects of the free tutoring service are being replicated by California's Harvey Mudd College to help students in the Claremont area.

This partnership features the two top nationally ranked undergraduate engineering institutions in U.S. News & World Report's 2009 College Guide.

Rose-Hulman's Homework Hotline has been helping Indiana students develop better problem-solving skills since 1991 through tutoring via toll-free phone calls, e-mails and online resources. The service has answered more than 280,000 calls since 2002, including 33,991 in the first five months of the 2009-10 school year.

# Campus Career Fairs Attract More Companies

Rose-Hulman is experiencing increased interest from companies seeking quality candidates to fill full time, internship and co-op positions in engineering, science and mathematics –- attracting more than 200 companies and 500 recruiters for the college's first two career fairs this school year. The final fair is planned for April 21.

The total of companies attending the winter career fair was 10 percent higher than last year.

"The number of companies that we have been able to attract is a positive in these economic times . . . It is still a challenging marketplace, but opportunities do exist (for college graduates)," admits Kevin Hewerdine, director of career services and employer relations. "Companies are still seeking quality candidates that can make a difference and help them weather these challenging times."

Career fields most in demand this year are computer science, electrical engineering and computer engineering.

#### **EcoCAR Team Begins Work on New Vehicle**

Students and faculty are exploring cutting-edge technology in their exploration of vehicle solutions that will reduce energy consumption and decrease emissions through the EcoCAR: The Next Challenge. The national engineering design competition is part of Rose-Hulman's advanced transportation systems initiative that's endorsed by industry and government entities.

The EcoCAR team has begun to construct a hybrid-electric vehicle to achieve improved fuel economy and reduced greenhouse gas emissions, while retaining the vehicle's performance and consumer appeal. The vehicle will feature a diesel engine using B-20 diesel fuel, and two electric motors arranged in a parallel pre-post transmission architecture.

Rose-Hulman celebrated its past achievements in innovation and looked forward to its promising future during the spectacular Leading the Next Decade of Innovation celebration. The event, attended by more than 700 persons, highlighted the first decade of Rose-Hulman Ventures, a one-of-a-kind educational program that provides student interns with outstanding technical and professional experiences.

Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels received the inaugural "Excellence in Innovation" Award while former Rose-Hulman President Samuel F. Hulbert was also honored.

Students played a major role in the celebration, with Sarah Erhart, 2009-10 student body president, talking about how the Lilly Endowment's community scholarship program made it possible for her to attend Rose-Hulman; Thomas Reives, student leader, discussed his experiences as a mechanical engineering graduate and current engineering management student; Allyson Nelson sang "America the Beautiful," and Jordan Goslee delivered the invocation.

A special guest at the event was Nico Bastolla, a 6-year-old boy whose life was dramatically impacted by a minimally invasive surgery tool developed at Rose-Hulman Ventures by a team of students and project managers. The device was used to successfully remove a tumor from the base of Nico's brain in 2004. His father, Mike, thanked members of the student team that attended the event, including seniors Nathan Hazard and Annie Bullock, and 2009 graduate Phil Ramage.

Andrew Milluzzi, a sophomore computer engineering major, aspires to use his love of math and science to perform applied research to reconfigure computing systems.



# **Giving Back**

# Students Reach Out to Help Others through Service

Rose-Hulman was honored for its commitment to volunteering and civic engagement by being named to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll. This marks the second straight year for this national recognition.

The Corporation for National and Community Service, which administers the annual Honor Roll award, honored Rose-Hulman for developing innovative programs to meet local needs.



Exemplary Rose-Hulman community service projects in 2008-09 were: Bikes For Tykes, which had students from 20 organizations assembling 450 bicycles for needy children and their families; nine student groups helped TREES Inc. plant trees to help beautify Terre Haute; and an Up Til Dawn event raised public awareness and \$16,760 to support St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Special emphasis was made to highlight universities that made a positive impact on community issues from poverty and homelessness to environmental justice. Rose-Hulman's pro-

grams in these areas included the EMERGE mentoring project, which had students setting up small learning communities for female freshman Vigo County School Corporation students to guide them toward successful careers.

Other ways students have reached out to help others are:

◆ Helping Haiti: Student Athlete Advisory Committee members collected more than 2,400 pounds of clothing that were donated to those in need in Haiti following a catastrophic 7.0 earthquake that hit the country.

The campus community responded to the tragedy by donating goods, specifically clothing and shoes, to the effort. Several local organizations also provided donations that later amassed more than 75 bags of items.

In addition to the effort involving Haiti, additional goods such as sweaters, boots and coats that were received in the drive were donated to the Salvation Army of the Wabash Valley, to help those within the local community.

◆ Service Day: More than 230 students joined faculty and staff members in provided helping hands to 25 Terre Haute organizations during the college's Rose-Hulman Day of Service event. The event was sponsored by Rincon Research.




